Moonie Trexler was a member of our organization since 1970 and an active charter member since 1976. Gene "Moonie" Trexler also served as our Youth Athletic Director from 1980 - 1993 and was part of the Patriots Committee for the 1984 International Softball Congress (ISC) Men's Major Word Championships held at Patriots Park in August of that year.

In recognition of his many years of service, "Moonie" received the 1978 Workhorse Award and the 1995 Bucky Boyle Award.

Mr. Mayor, Members of Allentown City Council, and To All Else This May Concern,

On January 27, 2021, Gene "Moonie" Trexler passed away at the age of 90. He was, in my opinion, an icon in the Lehigh Valley. Particularly in the local world of baseball and especially at Pates Park. He coached for many many years and did not have a personal interest in doing so, such as having a child on the team. No, he coached because he loved the game and wanted to pass that on to the youth of south Allentown area. He was my coach, and he made a huge impact on my life. He made a positive impact on all of those he coached. He taught us about sportsmanship, fair play, as well as winning isn't everything. He is a big reason for me becoming a coach of girls' softball. I find myself using lessons I learned from Coach Trexler and applying them to the teams I coached.

Mr. Trexler sacrificed time with his own family and spend countless hours at Pates Park coaching teams, prepping the field, etc. He gave his time to many boys of the south side of Allentown and his only payment was the gratification he received from his players and parents, and quite a few championship trophies.

Mr. Trexler also started the Old Timers softball league and traveled with the team to numerous locations both local and out of state. He loved to play handball and you could find him at the local handball courts when he was in his 80's. He had a zest for life and was a great example that age truly is just a number.

I went to high school with Mr. Trexler's daughter, Denise, and we remain friends to this day. Over the years I would keep in contact with Mr. Trexler, and I had the privilege of being the DJ for his 50th Wedding Anniversary to his lovely wife Rosemary.

I have recently contacted the City of Allentown as well as the Mayor's Office. There is an alley that runs off S. 10th St., (currently Frederick St), and gives you access to where the basketball court and pavilion area is at Pates Park. It is where school buses and umpire's park. I have filed a proposal to make this alley," Moonie Trexler Way."

I would love to surprise Denise Trexler and her family (Mr. Trexler's widow, Rosemary, and their son Gene) with this gift. I believe this would mean the world to them and would be a legacy to leave behind for not only his family but for all the young men Mr. Trexler coached over the years. It would be a permanent fixture that would remind us of all the memories he gave us as a coach. We could return time and time again and show our own children the kind of coach we had.

I am also a PIAA/USSSA softball umpire, and it would mean so much to me to drive to Pates Park to umpire or attend a game and see Mr. Trexler's name. I have met with the Board of Directors of Patriots Park, and they unanimously approved and support this idea. A letter from them is included in rest of this packet.

I will be reaching to Channel 69 news and the south Allentown/Pates community to be present for the reveal, and post on Facebook live should this become reality and get approved. I am also going to reach out to Cassie Schmidt, a sports reporter for Service Electric and see if she would be willing to bring a crew out to film the reveal. Keith Groller of the Morning Call is also on my list of people to contact to cover this event. Jon Adams of Patriot Organization agreed to help me with a small reception under the pavilion at the revealing celebration if approved. If approved, I would like to have the reveal on August 20, 2022. There is a double header softball game at 5 pm at Patriots Park between the Old Timers and

WFMZ. Being that Mr. Trexler founded the Old Timers League, I thought it would be perfect timing for his teammates to be in attendance and have the reveal before the games.

Please help me make this a reality. Mr. Trexler was one of the best human beings you could ever imagine. He was a loving husband, brother, father, grandfather, coach, and friend.

Attached to this letter is a series of letters/emails I received from others who support me in pursuing this petition and changing Frederick St. to "Moonie Trexler Way."

Mr. Gene "Moonie" Trexler was a coach, neighbor, mentor, and friend to me while growing up in the Patriots Park neighborhood of Allentown, PA. As a coach, Mr. Trexler was the patriarch of the Allentown Patriots organization and his impact on my life continues to this day.

I first became acquainted with Mr. Trexler while watching his city league baseball teams practice and play at Pate's park. His coaching style was calm and supportive. His kindness and equitable coaching style still serves as a model to me in my own coaching and teaching. His teams were always competitive and he was beloved by his players, former players, parents, and the community. As a teenager, I was the Trexler's paper boy, delivering the Allentown Morning Call each morning to his house on Poplar street. Many times, while collecting, I spent time just talking to Mr. and Mrs. Trexler and I always felt better about myself after doing so.

For more than 20 years, Mr. Trexler took a monthly turn driving the Allentown Patriots box truck around south Allentown to collect newspapers that we would take to the recycling center and earn money for the Patriot's organization. Usually two players accompanied Mr. Trexler and I went on that route with him many times as a teenager. What I remember most is the easy conversation and unbridled kindness of the man. After loading, and then unloading the truck at the recycling center, Mr. Trexler always treated us to a steak sandwich and pierogies at Zandy's.

Mr. Trexler was also a weekend warrior in his own right. He was an avid handball player who counted the South Mountain Junior High School principal as one of his playing partners. Mr. Trexler also organized and participated in a weekly "old-timers" softball game that was played on Thursday mornings at 8am. He often joked about some of the "old guys" who couldn't run the bases but still got out there anyway.

As a father, husband, teacher, and coach, I am part of Mr. Trexler's legacy. The impact he had on me can be seen in the conversations and interactions I have with my students in the classroom and my players on the court/field. I strongly support the renaming of Frederick St. to Moonie Trexler Way and cannot think of a more deserving man who, as a pillar of the community in which he lived, gave selflessly, and positively impacted so many.

younger players with their development in baseball and in life in general. Moonie has had a lifetime of abundant friends and family who have had the pleasure of knowing and respecting Mr Trexler.


I would highly recommend Mr Trexler to have a street named after him, especially at or near Patriots Park.
