


4. Emergency Solutions Grant or ESG is a formula grant program. Eligible recipients generally consist of metropolitan cities, urban counties, territories, and states, as defined in 24 CFR 576.2. In PA there are jurisdictions receiving funds besides the state. Those jurisdictions are Allentown, Eerie, Harrisburg, Lancaster City, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Reading, Scranton, Allegheny Co, Beaver Co, Berks County, Bucks Co, Chester Co, Delaware County, Luzerne Co, Montgomery Co, Northampton Co, Washington Co, Westmorland Co, York Co, and Bensalem Township.

Capital/Operating

- Supplement 9% LIHTC projects to finance more applicants during the 2022 cycle and beyond,
- Finance 9% LIHTC projects that did not receive awards in previous years due to limited funding amounts,
- Pair with State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds to finance the acquisition or construction of the development,
- Pair with 4% LIHTC and tax-exempt bonds for the cost of construction and/or the permanent financing of a project
- Buydown the debt on existing affordable housing units to reduce the project's overall costs and convert a portion of units to supportive housing
- Capitalized Operating Reserve

Supportive Services

- Potentially eligible services include
- Childcare
- Skill Building
- Mental Health Services
- Outpatient Health Services
- Substance Use Treatment Services
- Case Management
- Housing Retention
- Considerations on time limits as an argument for bridge resources and capacity building
