Lack of Affordable Housing




- One in four renters in U.S. spend more than half their income on housing
- 36 affordable rental units for every 100 very low-income households
- Most new construction is for higher-income families

46% of people living in shelters are intact families.

Homelessness impacts our children socially, emotionally and academically.

Children in a shelter for 90 days are 40% more likely to enter the child welfare system.

Every child in foster care costs \$25,000 - \$37,000 per year.

ACYF, 2012



Homelessness impacts our emergency rooms, detox centers and jails, costing \$30,000/year per person.

40% of homeless youth identify as LGBTQ+

ACYF, 2012



50% of homeless adults do not suffer from a mental illness or disability.

1 out of every 14 Americans experience homelessness sometime in their lives.

63% of all homeless in Lehigh Valley live in Allentown




 1,095 children experienced homelessness in 2020

Homelessness in Allentown - 2020



70% were from 18102 zip code

#1 – Insufficient Income

#2 - Evicted or Kicked Out

#3 – Mental Health (9%)

#4 – Domestic Violence (8%)

#5 – Substance Abuse (4%)

Often Uncounted – Homeless Youth



1 in 30 adolescents (ages 13-17) experience homelessness.*

Allentown – 292 youth will experience homelessness this year**

Our Shelters are Full



CACLV's 6th Street Shelter
 Wait List of 3-4 months

- No immediate shelter beds for families or single women.
- No housing for parents with intellectual disabilities with young children.

1st Strategy – Prevention/Rental Assistance



 Keeping people in their homes has best outcomes

 \$20M in new Federal funding to Lehigh County

- Provide flexible assistance funds
 - ASD's Rooster Relief Fund

2nd Strategy – Property Owner Engagement Initiative



Hire Housing Navigators

Property Owner Incentives

Risk Mitigation Funds

Property Owner-Tenant Mediation

3rd Strategy – Expand Housing Options







Option #1 - Rapid Rehousing



 People & families literally homeless

Low-Barrier of Entry

Less expensive

HUD Best Practice

Option #2 - Renovate Vacant Homes



2,100 Vacant single-family homes*

 Redevelopment Authority has taken 50+ properties

We support CED's idea of a Land Bank

Designate funding to rehab for homeless families

Option #3 - Permanent Supportive Housing



Project HOME - Philadelphia

 Long-term housing for the chronically homeless

Connect to community services

 Improves health outcomes and lowers public costs

Option #4 - Tiny Home Village



Year-Round Emergency Shelter





4th Strategy – Develop New Funding Streams



- Public Funding Options
 - Designate new tax revenue for affordable housing
 - Bond issue for capital expenses

- Private/Public Funding
 - Low-Income Housing Tax Credit Program (LIHTC)*

*LIHTC allocates tax credits to the states that developers use to raise capital for the construction of affordable rental housing. In exchange for receiving the tax credits, developers agree to keeps rents affordable for a number of years in the apartments that are built.



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
