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AN ORDINANCE

Amending the 2018 Capital Fund Budget by transferring from the Residential Streets Project (1748) and the Refurbishing Building Facilities Project (2007) Account 46 to the 76 Account of the Refurbishing Building Facilities Project (2007) to provide funding for the replacement of the fueling station and underground storage tanks at the Municipal Garage on Vultee Street.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ALLENTOWN:

SECTION ONE: That City Council authorizes a transfer within the Capital Fund as follows:

Department of Public Works

- **Summary and Facts of the Bill**

Bill would facilitate a transfer between (2) Public Works capital projects with funds ultimately going towards replacement of the underground storage tanks and fueling station located at the Municipal Garage

Funding estimates on this project began in 2015. Project has been pushed off due to the unknown status of the City's lease with LVIA for the Municipal Garage. Now that a long-term lease is in place, the project is slated for completion.

Due to inflation over the years, the project estimate has also increased. This bill will ensure proper funding is available for the removal/replacement of our underground storage tanks and fueling station.

Overall cost would be neutral for the City, as the funds have already been budgeted in various projects in the Capital Fund.

Funds should be transferred as follows:

\$75,000 should come from 001-03-2007-1501-46

We are currently awaiting final approval from the FAA. Proposals were submitted with the hopes of work beginning in the spring of 2018.

- **Why should Council unanimously support this bill?**

The systems that are currently in place are old and dated. As we can no longer push this project off, they should be replaced sooner rather than later. Failure to update the systems currently in place could lead to costly environmental clean-ups and fines from the DE/EPA.
